# Annual School Report 2021-2022

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#### A. Our School

#### Mission Statement

#### B. Our Learning and Teaching

#### 1. Introduction

'Manage Learning, Manage Health and Manage Responsibilities' continued to be our developmental highlights in 2020-21. The Academic Affairs Committee (AA) and departments of various KLAs worked closely to 'Manage Learning', by means of:

- a. fostering School-based Professional Development for Department Heads and Teachers;
- b. conducting Lesson Study

#### This part will:

- a. highlight the significant academic initiatives in 2020-21 and academic support measures;
- b. review the effectiveness of these initiatives and their impact on learning and teaching;
- c. briefly outline our future direction

#### 2. Major Concern

2.1 Manage Learning – Fostering School-based Professional Development for Department Heads and Teachers

Being the developmental focus for 'Manage Learning', elements of Assessment as Learning (AaL) were introduced by stages in four years in 2018-2022, with self-directed learning being the ultimate goal.

In 2021-22, several key elements of assessment were introduced to colleagues through department heads' meetings and departmental meetings, as well as to students through long assemblies. The following were focused on:

- Knowledge Management (lesson study)
- Time management skills
- Peer feedback for collaborative learning
- Groupwork to foster collaborative learning
- Formative use of assessment data (Assessment for Learning)
- Revision Strategies
- AaL to foster Self-directed Learning

Time management skills including setting schedules and prioritization are very important elements of self-directed learning. Feedback from peers, whether verbal or written, encourages reflection on learning and provides guidance on improvement. Collaborative group work benefits students academically and socially. Formative use of assessment

data informs learning and teaching effectiveness so that strategies can be devised to tackle learning difficulties and common misconceptions. AaL motivates students to act on feedback and evaluate their own learning strategies and progress for improvement. Revision strategies for long-term retention and with timely self-assessment enhance the learning effectiveness.

A total of 13 teachers voluntarily formed a reading club. 6 meetings were scheduled. The book read and discussed was *Powerful Task Design: Rigorous and Engaging Tasks to Level Up Instruction*. Teachers had fruitful sharing and discussion on the strategies to design learning tasks in classrooms and the difficulties that would be encountered. Some teachers modified their learning or assessment tasks after reading the book.

A systematic and structured induction course for new teachers who have been serving in Carmel for less than two years was organized. The mission and vision of Carmel were shared. A total of 10 teachers, including the Principal and Vice Principals, attended 8 one-hour sessions. Being familiarized with the latest development of Carmel in both academic and student development aspects, new teachers can identify with the school culture and work collaboratively with their colleagues.

#### 2.2 Manage Learning – Conducting Lesson Study on AaL

Lesson study is a valuable means to experiment with curricular and pedagogical initiatives. It facilitates the revision or refinement of the practised secondary curriculum and equips teachers with knowledge and skills applicable to everyday teaching and learning.

The lesson study on AaL aligned with the school-based professional development focus, and most academic departments incorporated peer assessment into their lesson design and trial. Three departments shared their experiences with other teachers on the third staff development day.

#### 2.3 Curricular Initiative – New Subject named Life and Values Education

The school capitalized on the optimization of the four senior secondary core subjects and, with the professional support of CUHK's Quality School Improvement Project, piloted a two-year school-based curriculum on life and values education. A triple lesson in the school timetable was allocated per cycle in each S4 class for this new subject and modules covered healthy living, life education, sex education, media and information literacy and entrepreneurship. The S4 curriculum will be revised and S5 curriculum developed in 2022-23.

#### 3. Academic Support Measures

#### 3.1 Reading Programmes

#### 3.1.1 Junior Nonfiction Reading Programme

This reading programme continued to play a pivotal role in cross-curricular reading and language across the curriculum. Its wide range of books recommended by different academic departments and student development committees, and a variety of response tasks encompassing speaking, writing and drawing cater for multiple intelligences and learning styles. Elements of self-directed learning are also manifested in the deliberate development of metacognitive habits of mind such as goal-setting, evaluation and reflection. During the period of class suspension, online reading lessons were conducted and more students read the e-books from the school e-library. The checkout record of books was 750 for S1, 1145 for S2 and 558 for S3.

#### 3.1.2 School Library

A number of reading activities were held by the school library, including an Inter-House Reading Competition (with 58 participants), one bookmark design competition, one Reading Café session, S1-S3 short assemblies on the importance of reading and on anecdotes in Hong Kong. 244 students took part in the library's Exploring a New Horizon Reading Award Scheme. Two training sessions on "Skills for Reading Activities Promotion" were provided to all S1-S2 student librarians.

Due to face to face class suspension, three scheduled book fairs, 4.23 World Book Day game booths and book crossing activity had to be cancelled. Students were encouraged to join online reading activities and related school library extension activities, such as "The Top Ten Book Picks" which was organized by the HK Reading City.

Library literacy lessons for S1-S3 students continued to be organized, and they equipped the students with research skills in using library resources. The response was positive. Over 91% of students agreed or strongly agreed that the lessons enhanced their library literacy.

As a result of face to face class suspension, the library loan service had to be suspended. E-books were then promoted. The checkout record of library books was as follows:

#### 3.1.3 Book Sharing

Reading was also promoted by academic departments such as Chinese, English, History and Economics and Business Education Departments. The Story-sharing Corner in the Air was launched throughout the year in the Google Classroom. There were altogether 453 clips submitted with comments and encouragement given by teachers and student helpers. 69 students (S1: 29; S2: 40) participated in the activity four times or above and their effort was recognized in their OLE Records.

#### 3.2 English, Chinese, Mathematics and Science Enrichment Classes

Junior enrichment classes for high ability students were theme-based and aimed at enabling students to gain exposure and extend their learning experiences. The Chinese Language classes were primarily on Chinese Literature and Culture, the English Language classes on translation, English Literature, debating and drama, and Science and Mathematics classes on training students to enter external competitions. Students had good participation and enjoyed the lessons. On the other hand, enrichment classes for weak students were organized to supplement regular lessons, with the focus on clarifying misconceptions and consolidating learning.

#### 3.3 Gifted Education Programmes

The needs of gifted students continued to be addressed through gifted programmes in and outside of school. Forty-four students were members of the HKAGE and five students were on HKUST's Dual Program.

In-school pull-out programs were organized by academic departments but a number of sessions were held online due to the face to face class suspension. Examples of gifted programmes are:

#### 3.4 Recognition of Academic Achievements

A great number of students were awarded a Certificate of Academic Merit or Academic Excellence in recognition of their effort in meeting an academic standard. 14.1% of 647 students obtained the Certificate of Academic Merit and 25.8% the Certificate of Academic Excellence (See the actual numbers in each form below). This award system minimized negative competition and encouraged students to work towards attainment of an academic goal.

#### 4. Looking Ahead

The major concerns will be "Take Charge of Learning. Live by Values" in the new school development plan in 2022-25, and the focus of work in 2022-23 will be:

- consolidation of AaL elements including assessment literacy, self-assessment and peer assessment
- fostering self-directed learning through interactive use of information technology
- development of an online learning material platform and an online assessment platform
- establishment of a BYOD policy

#### C. Support for Student Development

#### 1. Introduction

Due to the pandemic, 2021-22 was the fourth and last year of the extended '3-year' School Development Cycle, with the themes set as "Manage Learning, Manage Health and Manage Responsibilities". The Student Development Committee (SD) focused on the latter two domains. Despite constant challenges like half-day schooling for most levels in the first term and a Special Vacation, and the closing of the school year in mid-August, both teachers and students have had very meaningful and fruitful experiences. We were awarded '優化大獎' in '樂繋校園獎勵計劃' for our efforts in 2020-21, proving our endeavours in this couple of 'new normal' years on the wellness of Carmelians had been recognized.

#### This document will:

- a. review SD's programmes carried out in 2021-22 in line with the major concern "Manage Learning, Manage Health and Manage Responsibilities" and give an overall evaluation;
- b. provide a brief outlook for our future development.

#### 2. Major Concern (2018-2022)

Highlights of programmes that align with the school major concern:

#### 2.1 Manage Health – Healthy Living

Objectives:

• To enable Carmelians to lead a spiritually, physically and mentally healthy life

Monday Morning Assemblies involving bible reading and devotion were regularly held, giving Carmelians a good start of a week. About 100 students recorded their reflections after the session, proving that the practice did leave an impact. Amid the pandemic's disruption, Morning Devotion was still held as usual, with students across different forms joining in. About 50 of them were awarded the prize of 'regular attendance'. The school Fellowship was run in the afternoon online, drawing close to 40 students from at least 15 classes to take part constantly. The Gospel Week entitled 'The Gospel that we can Experience' led Carmelians to reflect on the Lord's grace on their life. The Small Group Ministry made a good progress this year. Apart from sharing the gospel on campus with the Gospel 5 Colour Beads they made during the theme week, members of the groups initiated the 'Christmas Caroling' event before Christmas, blessing the Oi Man community with hymns and gospel packs; closer to the final exam, they passed on to their schoolmates little gifts together with their testimonies in the 'Too Blessed to be Stressed' activity. It is gladdening to see Carmel Christians living out their faith. The signature events like Carmel Christian Conference in September, Christmas Service, Prayer Day in February and Easter Service were also organized, giving timely spiritual nutrients to both teachers and students. Every crisis is an opportunity. The daily 'Sweeter than Honey' 迦言蜜語 message posted on the school website, Morning Devotion Special and Fellowship activities during the Special Vacation lifted all up during the gloomy moments of our city. The great efforts of the Religious Affairs Committee (RAC) in promoting students' spiritual health were indeed evident.

Alongside spiritual health promotion, the morning assemblies underscoring strategies to develop positive thinking, gratitude, resilience and practical ways to handle adversities were held. These virtues were further reinforced in the theme week named 'It's OK not to be OK' organized by the Counselling and Guidance Committee (CGC). The 'Friday Zone 一粒' activity was popular among students, where they enjoyed chess and board games with buddies and teachers, stayed connected and got a lift in spirits. Various small groups such as S1-S3 Social Groups, S4 Support Group and Sessions for S5 students were run by School Social Workers, Student Counselor, CGC and Career and Life Planning Committee (CLP). The groups enhanced students' self-understanding, self-efficacy and mutual trust, also providing tips of stress and emotion management. S2 students making artworks as tokens of encouragement for S6 students sitting the public exam and S3 students making sweet soup and cookies supporting janitors and teachers were so sweet and heartening. Career advising for senior form students regularly provided by CLP and class teachers, together with various types of activities like

physical or online visits to tertiary institutions helped students with goal setting and spread positivity, relieving students of stress caused by worries about studying pathways. Senior form students were very positive about the 'Gear Up' activity that motivated them to join at least one program related to further studies. CLP's theme week entitled 'Well-being @Work' also assured students that they could live a fulfilling life at work in future, with proper planning and mindset. Carmelians' mental health is well maintained.

Facing the constant struggles due to the pandemic, students' physical health matters much. Posters on breathing exercises and sleeping issues were put up in classrooms. There were morning assembly messages on sleep, eye exercise, stretching and bone health. Our student-led Sports Activities Committee (SAC) grabbed every chance to promote sports. The 7-minute daily exercise drive has been in force since the last academic year, attracting over 200 students. Our Sports Day could not be run in the sports ground but inter-house and teacher-student dodge ball matches were held. There were also different game booths hosted by the Student Union (SU), SAC and four Houses. The 25-day Fitness Challenge Bingo and 21-Day scheme catering to students' mental health, diet and religious state initiated by SAC and SU respectively in the Special Vacation kept students in a healthy mood and encouraged habit-forming. During the post-exam OLE days, inter-class volleyball competitions and basketball matches were organized, not to mention the exchanges between Carmel sports teams (including volleyball, basketball and table-tennis teams) and those of other schools wherever possible throughout the year.

In a word, Carmelians' awareness of health management has been well enhanced in these few years, and during such a challenging period with lots of changes, struggles and uncertainties, we have ridden the tide, grabbing the chances to promote our spiritual, physical and mental health.

#### 2.2 Manage Responsibilities – Responsible Citizenship

#### Objectives:

- To cultivate Carmelians' sense of responsibility, courtesy and care for others, our environment and our city
- To enhance Carmelians' understanding of our country and their sense of belonging
- To stretch Carmelians' leadership qualities

Connectedness is the glue for one's social development. S1 students were welcomed by a series of orientation activities from late August to early September. The Growth Camp for all S1 students took a hybrid mode, building up class spirit and nurturing students with biblical values. Survey findings indicated that they loved the team building exercise and heart-to-heart talk with class teachers most. Such connectedness catered to their developmental needs. The Edifying Camp was organized online for S1-S5 during the Special Vacation, with over 100 students and teachers taking part, which was a record high. They pledged to be committed Christians, and be a blessing to others. The 'Welcome Back to School' drive right after the Special Vacation reconnected Carmelians, getting everyone ready for face to face school resumption. Our scouts, comprising about 100 students across different forms, had regular gatherings face to face or

through electronic means. During the Christmas time, English Ambassadors presented a music clip featuring compilations of photos of Carmel students and teachers without masks looking up to the sky, conveying a sense of hope. This warmed the hearts of many. Two other programmes worthy of mention were S5 'Life Camp' which was run in a series of support programs, boosting class spirits and offering career advising, and S6 Farewell Assembly, in which S6 students urged their younger siblings to cherish their teachers, classmates and everyday time with one another, further strengthening the Carmel bonding. The School Picnic Day was well-received, and was a precious occasion for all to share their good class morale and strong ties through mass games. Junior forms also grabbed the chance to make clips on proper etiquette in and out of classrooms on the Picnic Day to join the inter-class video clip competition "有禮校園" staged by the Disciplinary and Moral Education Committee (DMC). The clips were well thought out, reflecting Carmelians' understanding of self-discipline and mutual respect. Students had fun and learnt at the same time.

Hardly can a caring school be established without due care to SEN students and sufficient support Our SEN Committee has spared no pains in guiding students with special from parents. needs. There were behavior /social training, individual counseling, test/ exam accommodation, arrangement of HKDSE special examination, a parent group facilitating exchange of information and emotional support, collaboration with the school-based educational psychologist, speech therapist, clinical psychologist, CGC, CLP and Academic Affairs Committee and so forth throughout the year. Our school social workers and student counsellor were involved wherever necessary. Regular meetings of the Board Game Group and Transport Society have helped develop the networks and social skills of students diagnosed or suspected with SEN. Counselling sessions were arranged throughout the year and teachers kept good contact with the SEN students and their parents regularly. The continual reviews and updates of the policies and procedures on special examination arrangements have been great support for SEN students in need of exam accommodation. Through our parent group, parents' understanding of the school's policies and the development of the SEN students has been enhanced. To better equip all staff members, talks and sharing sessions by the educational psychologist and teachers having received SEN training of different levels were arranged throughout the year, while assemblies and post-exam activities on inclusive education have helped deepen every Carmelian's understanding and empathy towards the disadvantaged. A holistic approach has been taken to create a stress-free, caring and conducive environment for students with needs.

To care is to serve. Carmelians have always sought opportunities to serve the community, under the guidance of the school social workers and Civic Education Committee (CEC). Though many voluntary programmes could not be carried out due to hygiene concerns, a group of senior form students ran online tutorials for some primary students from low-income families regularly. Our VolunPeers also held a bazaar in school to raise funds for our sister school in Cambodia, initiated beach-cleaning, served in a dog shelter, visited street sleepers and helped in flag-selling whenever possible. They shared their good deeds in the junior form assemblies, serving as good examples. A batch of S3 students took part in the Youth Impact Award 2.0 organized by the

Boys' & Girls' Clubs Association of Hong Kong, submitting a proposal introducing an innovative solution to improve the life of those living in sub-divided flats. They won the Merit Award. Twenty-five CYC members have served the community for more than 15 hours, and three of them over 100 hours. Andy Tsang, who scored a perfect 5\*\* across eight subjects in the HKDSE, has been elected outstanding CYC member in the Kowloon City District.

The importance of responsible citizenship has been driven home through various means. The Week of Religion entitled 'Master? Manager?' reminded all members of school of our humble roles as stewards when handling resources on earth and the proper attitude to take when getting along with other creations. The theme week co-organized by DMC and CEC focused on a drugfree lifestyle, which was part of our whole-year anti-drug initiative covering a talk for staff, lecture, movie show and relevant class-teacher period materials. Over 90% of students found it informative and useful, and showed determination to lead a drug-free life and be law-abiding. During the post-exam activity days, knowledge about underage drinking was passed on to students through game booths organized by two S5 students, who had joined a series of training sessions held by the Polytechnic University. Ten volunteers from PolyU helped run the booths and over 100 students visited them. The workshop on fake news held by Hong Kong News-Expo for all S3 students equipped the teens to live a responsible life. They regarded the activity as truly inspiring and practical, helping them to identify fake news and to know how to respond to it.

CEC has kept nurturing Carmelians' green concepts through running Green Days and training the Low-carbon Ambassadors in each class. Messages on recycling, waste reduction and so forth were conveyed in different assemblies, enhancing students' environmental awareness. A group of students joined the Sustainable Development Goals leadership training programmes by CUHK and ran a series of activities on campus to urge Carmelians to lower their carbon footprints through changing their daily habits. They received very good responses as many schoolmates indicated their willingness to go green. Over 50 students joined the hydroponics workshop, learning to grow crops in an environmentally-friendly manner. National education is definitely Programmes on the Basic Law, Constitutional Education, national security education and the like have been implemented. Flag raising ceremonies have been held weekly. Ten S4 students joined the Basic Law Ambassadors Scheme, enhancing their understanding of our country. They shared with all schoolmates through the school newsletter and during the flag raising ceremony. Several S4 students took part in a series of training workshops on life education run by Young Artist in Residence V54 (Pok Leung Kuk). They shared their reflections towards 'loss' through their own art works, which were displayed in public, and had a chance to host radio programs interviewing guests overcoming adversities. Other attitudes and values such as integrity, perseverance, empathy, responsibility, commitment and so on were disseminated through Class Teacher Periods, assemblies and personal guidance, with a view to permeating our campus with proper virtues and every Carmelian holding on to them.

Training Day Camp for student leaders were held as usual, in an online, hybrid or face-to-face mode. S1 class leaders, for instance, received training online and all of them were determined to serve whole-heartedly and 94.3% of them strongly agreed that they were aware of their duties and confident of performing their roles. Class leaders training would go on in the summer break. Each leader has been given a booklet of well-being from Jockey Club's Project Well-being. Their experiences on goal setting and habit development for their well-being would be good reflections and samples for other schoolmates to follow. Prefect and monitor prefect training was also proven fruitful according to the survey findings. In brief, with the guidance of the Extra-Curricular Activities Committee (ECA), student leaders helped with the school's virtual Info Day, Sports Day and post-exam OLE Days. No doubt, Carmel student leaders have always been given the chance to get empowered and learn how to stay flexible in different circumstances.

Not to be missed is our new senior secondary subject Life and Values Education. It is a new curriculum initiative, was tried out in S4 this academic year and will be extended to S5 in 2022-23. In the S4 lessons, students reflected deeply on issues like appearance and dieting, romance, risks in the Cyberworld, entrepreneurship involving revitalization of an old street and so on. This obviously benefits students' overall wellness and enhances their sense of responsible citizenship.

In hindsight, Carmelians joined hands to stay connected and to actualize the major concern. The **Special Vacation Activity Schedule** is a case in point showing how we handled a sudden challenge positively and flexibly. The exceptionally brilliant HKDSE results this year also proved that Carmelians are willing to gear up, go the extra mile (major concerns 2015-18) as well as able to manage learning, health and responsibilities (major concern 2018-22). It is truly gratifying that many of the S6 graduates have discovered and developed their potentials through their secondary schooling, apart from gaining good academic results.

#### 3. Looking Ahead

- Another 3-year cycle will start next year, with the major concerns 'Take Charge of Learning. Live by Values.' This is a continuation of strategies regarding the school's academic development and response to the needs of society.
- Values education is the focus of the Student Development committees. Comprehensive and timely measures will be implemented to instill proper virtues and attitudes into students for their whole-person development.




